

SCRIPTURE READINGS FOR USE AT THE FUNERAL MASS

THE WORD OF GOD

The word of God is of great importance in the funeral rite. The readings proclaim the meaning that Christ himself gave to death, teach us to remember the dead, nourish our hope of being gathered together again in God's kingdom, and encourage us to live the Christian life. Above all, the readings tell of God's design for a world in which suffering and death will be destroyed. In the readings all present have an opportunity to hear God speak to them in their needs, sorrows, fears and hopes. At the funeral liturgy the biblical readings may not be replaced by non-biblical ones.

CHOOSING READINGS (1 Reading + 1 Psalm + Gospel Acclamation + Gospel):

- the Reading is chosen from the Old Testament from the selection starting on pages 4-11 or from the New Testament from the selection on pages 30-46.
- In the Easter Season when the Reading is traditionally chosen from the selection on pages 13-17.
- If the Responsorial Psalm is not sung, one is read from the selection on page 19-28.
- Priest traditionally selects the Gospel but feel free to suggest from the pages 48-76.

**FIRST READING FROM
THE OLD TESTAMENT**

Maccabees 12:43-45

'He acted very well and honourably, taking account of the resurrection.'

A reading from the Second Book of Maccabees.

In those days: Judas, the leader of Israel
took up a collection, man by man,
to the amount of two thousand drachmas of silver
and sent it to Jerusalem to provide for a sin offering.
In doing this he acted very well and honourably,
taking account of the resurrection.
For if he were not expecting
that those who had fallen would rise again,
it would have been superfluous and foolish to pray for the dead.
But if he was looking to the splendid reward
that is laid up for those who fall asleep in godliness,
it was a holy and pious thought.
Therefore he made atonement for the dead,
that they might be delivered from their sin.

and while living among sinners he was taken up.
He was caught up lest evil change his understanding,
or guile deceive his soul.
For the fascination of wickedness obscures what is good,
and roving desire perverts the innocent mind.
Being perfected in a short time, he fulfilled long years;
for his soul was pleasing to the Lord,
therefore he took him quickly from the midst of wickedness.
Yet the peoples saw and did not understand
or take such a thing to heart,
that God's grace and mercy are with his elect,
and he watches over his holy ones.

Isaiah 25:6a, 7-9

'The Lord will swallow up death for ever.'

A reading from the Prophet Isaiah.

On that day:

On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples
a feast of rich food.

And he will swallow up on this mountain
the covering that is cast over all peoples,
the veil that is spread over all nations.

He will swallow up death for ever;
and the Lord God will wipe away tears from all faces,
and the reproach of his people he will take away from all the
earth,
for the Lord has spoken.

It will be said on that day,
'Behold, this is our God;
we have waited for him, that he might save us.
This is the Lord; we have waited for him;
let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.'

Lamentations 3:17-26

'It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the Lord.'

A reading from the Book of Lamentations.

My soul is bereft of peace;
I have forgotten what happiness is;
so I say, 'My endurance has perished;
so has my hope from the Lord.'

Remember my affliction and my wanderings,
the wormwood and the gall!
My soul continually remembers it
and is bowed down within me.

But this I call to mind,
and, therefore, I have hope:
The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases;
his mercies never come to an end;
they are new every morning;
great is your faithfulness.
'The Lord is my portion,' says my soul,
'therefore I will hope in him.'

The Lord is good to those who wait for him,
to the soul who seeks him.
It is good that one should wait quietly
for the salvation of the Lord.

Daniel 12:1-3

'Those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake.'

A reading from the Prophet Daniel.

In those days: I, Daniel, was mourning

And there shall be a time of trouble,
such as never has been since there was a nation till that time.
But at that time your people shall be delivered,
everyone whose name shall be found written in the book.
And many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake,
some to everlasting life,
and some to shame and everlasting contempt.
And those who are wise shall shine
like the brightness of the sky above;
and those who turn many to righteousness,
like the stars for ever and ever.'

**FIRST READING
FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT
DURING THE EASTER SEASON**

Acts 10:34-43

'He is the one appointed by God to be judge of the living and the dead.'

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In those days:

Peter opened his mouth and said:

'Truly I understand that God shows no partiality,
but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right
is acceptable to him.

As for the word that he sent to Israel,
preaching good news of peace through Jesus Christ —
he is Lord of all —

you yourselves know what happened throughout all Judea,
beginning from Galilee after the baptism that John proclaimed:
how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth
with the Holy Spirit and with power.

He went about doing good
and healing all who were oppressed by the devil,
for God was with him.

And we are witnesses of all that he did
both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree,
but God raised him on the third day and caused him to appear,
not to all the people

but to us who had been chosen by God as witnesses,
who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

And he commanded us to preach to the people
and to testify that he is the one appointed by God
to be judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets bear witness
that everyone who believes in him

receives forgiveness of sins through his name.’

and books were opened.

Then another book was opened, which is the Book of Life.
And the dead were judged by what was written in the books,
according to what they had done.

and they were judged, each one of them,
according to what they had done.

Then Death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire.

And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

He will wipe away every tear from their eyes,
and death shall be no more,

neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain any more,

for the sake of his name.
Though I should walk in the valley of the shadow of death,

in the sight of my foes.
My head you have anointed with oil;
my cup is overflowing. R.

In your merciful love remember me,
because of your goodness, O Lord. R.

Relieve the anguish of my heart,
and set me free from my distress.
See my lowliness and suffering,
and take away all my sins. R.

Preserve my life and rescue me.
Let me not be put to shame,
for in you I take refuge.
May integrity and virtue protect me,
for I have hoped in you, O Lord. R.

Responsorial Psalm 3

Psalm 27(26):1. 4. 7, 8c, 9a. 13-14. R. 1a or 13

R. The Lord is my light and my salvation.
or: I believe I shall see the Lord's goodness
in the land of the living.

The Lord is my light and my salvation;
whom shall I fear?
The Lord is the stronghold of my life;
whom should I dread? R.

There is one thing I ask of the Lord,
only this do I seek:
to live in the house of the Lord
all the days of my life,
to gaze on the beauty of the Lord,
to enquire at his Temple. R.

O Lord, hear my voice when I call;
have mercy and answer me.
It is your face, O Lord, that I seek;
hide not your face from me. R.

I believe I shall see the Lord's goodness in the land of the living.
Wait for the Lord; be strong;
be stout-hearted, and wait for the Lord! R.

with joyful lips, my mouth shall praise you. R.

in the shadow of your wings I rejoice.
My soul clings fast to you;
your right hand upholds me. R.

Psalm 103(102):8, 10. 13-14. 15-16. 17-18. R. 8a or 37(36):39a

R. The Lord is compassionate and gracious.

or: The salvation of the upright comes from the Lord.

The Lord is compassionate and gracious,
slow to anger and rich in mercy.
He does not treat us according to our sins,
nor repay us according to our faults. R.

As a father has compassion on his children,
the Lord's compassion is on those who fear him.
For he knows of what we are made;
he remembers that we are dust. R.

Man, his days are like grass;
he flowers like the flower of the field.
The wind blows, and it is no more,
and its place never sees it again. R.

But the mercy of the Lord is everlasting
upon those who hold him in fear,
upon children's children his justice,
for those who keep his covenant,
and remember to fulfil his commands. R.

R. I will walk in the presence of the Lord in the land of the living.
or: Alleluia. (outside lent)

How gracious is the Lord, and just;
our God has compassion.
The Lord protects the simple;
I was brought low, and he saved me. R.

I trusted, even when I said,
'I am sorely afflicted,'
and when I said in my alarm,
'These people are all liars.' R.

How precious in the eyes of the Lord
is the death of his faithful.
Your servant, Lord, your servant am I,
you have loosened my bonds. R.

Responsorial Psalm 8

Psalm 122(121):1-2. 4-5. 6-7. 8-9. R. 1 or cf. 1

R. I rejoiced when they said to me,
'Let us go to the house of the Lord.'

or: Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord.

I rejoiced when they said to me,
'Let us go to the house of the Lord.'
And now our feet are standing
within your gates, O Jerusalem. R.

It is there that the tribes go up,
the tribes of the Lord
as it is decreed for Israel,
to give thanks to the name of the Lord.
There were set the thrones for judgement,
the thrones of the house of David. R.

For the peace of Jerusalem pray,
'May they prosper, those who love you.'
May peace abide in your walls,
and security be in your towers. R.

For the sake of my family and friends,
let me say, 'Peace upon you.'
For the sake of the house of the Lord, our God,

Lord, hear my voice!
O let your ears be attentive
to the sound of my pleadings. R.

If you, O Lord, should mark iniquities,
Lord, who could stand?
But with you is found forgiveness,
that you may be revered. R.

I long for you, O Lord,
my soul longs for his word.
My soul awaits the Lord
more than watchmen for daybreak. R.

More than watchmen for daybreak,
let Israel hope for the Lord.
For with the Lord there is mercy,
in him is plentiful redemption.
It is he who will redeem Israel
from all its iniquities. R.

Responsorial Psalm 10

Psalm 143(142):1-2. 5-6. 7ab, 8ab. 10. R. 1a

R. Listen, O Lord, to my prayer.

Listen, O Lord, to my prayer;
turn your ear to my appeal.
You are faithful, you are just; give answer.

for no one is righteous in your sight. R.

I remember the days that are past;
I ponder all your works.
I muse on what your hand has wrought,
and to you I stretch out my hands.
My soul is like a parched land before you. R.

O Lord, make haste and answer me,
for my spirit fails within me.
In the morning, let me hear your loving mercy,
for in you I place my trust. R.

Teach me to do your will,

**SECOND READING FROM
THE NEW TESTAMENT**

New Testament Second Reading 1

Romans 5:5-11

*'We have been justified by his blood,
much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God.'*

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

Hope does not put us to shame,
because God's love has been poured into our hearts
through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.

For while we were still weak,
at the right time Christ died for the ungodly.

For one will scarcely die for a righteous person —
though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die —
but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners,
Christ died for us.

Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood,
much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God.

For if while we were enemies
we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son,
much more, now that we are reconciled,
shall we be saved by his life.

More than that,
we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ,
through whom we have now received reconciliation.

New Testament Second Reading 2

Romans 5:17-21

'Where sin increased, grace abounded all the more.'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

If, because of one man's trespass,
death reigned through that one man;
much more will those who receive the abundance of grace
and the free gift of righteousness
reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ.
Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men,
so one act of righteousness leads to justification
and life for all men.
For as by the one man's disobedience
the many were made sinners,
so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.
Now the law came in to increase the trespass,
but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more,
so that, as sin reigned in death,
grace also might reign through righteousness
leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Romans 6:3-9

'We might walk in newness of life.'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

Do you not know that all of us
who have been baptised into Christ Jesus
were baptised into his death?

We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death,
in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead
by the glory of the Father,
we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his,
we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.
We know that our old self was crucified with him
in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing,
so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin.
For one who has died has been set free from sin.
Now if we have died with Christ,
we believe that we will also live with him.
We know that Christ, being raised from the dead,
will never die again;
death no longer has dominion over him.

New Testament Second Reading 3
Shorter Form

Romans 6:3-4, 8-9
'We might walk in newness of life.'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

Do you not know that all of us

We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death,
in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead
by the glory of the Father,
we too might walk in newness of life.

death no longer has dominion over him.

New Testament Second Reading 4

Romans 8:14-23

'We wait eagerly for the redemption of our bodies.'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

All who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God.

For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear,
but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons,
by whom we cry, 'Abba! Father!'

The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit
that we are children of God,
and if children, then heirs —
heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ,
provided we suffer with him
in order that we may also be glorified with him.

For I consider that the sufferings of this present time
are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us.
For the creation waits with eager longing
for the revealing of the sons of God.

For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly,
but because of him who subjected it,
in hope that the creation itself will be set free
from its bondage to corruption,
and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God.

For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together
in the pains of childbirth until now.

And not only the creation, but we ourselves,
who have the firstfruits of the Spirit,

groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons,
the redemption of our bodies.

The word of the Lord.

New Testament Second Reading 5

Romans 8:31b-35, 37-39

'What can separate us from the love of Christ?'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

If God is for us, who can be against us?

He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all,
how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?

Who shall bring any charge against God's elect?

It is God who justifies.

Who is to condemn?

Christ Jesus is the one who died —
more than that, who was raised —
who is at the right hand of God,
who indeed is interceding for us.

Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?

Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution,
or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword?

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors
through him who loved us.

For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers,
nor things present nor things to come, nor powers,
nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation,
will be able to separate us from the love of God
in Christ Jesus our Lord.

New Testament Second Reading 6

Romans 14:7-9, 10c-12

'Whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's.'

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans.

Brothers and sisters:

None of us lives to himself, and none of us dies to himself.

For if we live, we live to the Lord,

and if we die, we die to the Lord.

So then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's.

For to this end Christ died and lived again,

that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living.

For we will all stand before the judgement seat of God;

for it is written,

'As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me,

and every tongue shall confess to God.'

So then, each of us will give an account of himself to God.

The word of the Lord.

1 Corinthians 15:20-24a, 25-28
'In Christ shall all be made alive.'

A reading from the First Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians.

Brothers and sisters:

Now Christ has been raised from the dead,
the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep.

For as by a man came death,
by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead.

For as in Adam all die,
so also in Christ shall all be made alive.

But each in his own order:

Christ the firstfruits,
then at his coming those who belong to Christ.

Then comes the end,
when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father.
For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet.

The last enemy to be destroyed is death.
For 'God has put all things in subjection under his feet.'

But when it says, 'all things are put in subjection',
it is plain that he is excepted
who put all things in subjection under him.

When all things are subjected to him,
then the Son himself will also be subjected to him
who put all things in subjection under him,
that God may be all in all.

1 Corinthians 15:20-23
'In Christ shall all be made alive.'

A reading from the First Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians.

Brothers and sisters:

Now Christ has been raised from the dead,

Gospel Reading 19

John 19:17-18b, 25-39

'He bowed his head and gave up his spirit.'

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

At that time:

Jesus went out, bearing his own cross,
to the place called The Place of a Skull,
which in Aramaic is called Golgotha.

There they crucified him,
and with him two others, one on either side,
and Jesus between them.

Standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother
and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas,
and Mary Magdalene.

When Jesus saw his mother
and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby,
he said to his mother, 'Woman, behold, your son!'
Then he said to the disciple, 'Behold, your mother!'
And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home.

After this, Jesus, knowing that all was now finished,
said (to fulfil the Scripture), 'I thirst.'

A jar full of sour wine stood there,
so they put a sponge full of the sour wine on a hyssop branch
and held it to his mouth.

When Jesus had received the sour wine,
he said, 'It is finished,'

and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

Since it was the day of Preparation,
and so that the bodies would not remain on the cross
on the Sabbath
(for that Sabbath was a high day),
the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken
and that they might be taken away.
So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first,
and of the other who had been crucified with him.
But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead,
they did not break his legs.
But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear,
and at once there came out blood and water.
He who saw it has borne witness —
his testimony is true, and he knows that he is telling the truth —
that you also may believe.
For these things took place that the Scripture might be fulfilled:
'Not one of his bones will be broken.'
And again another Scripture says,
'They will look on him whom they have pierced.'

After these things Joseph of Arimathea,
who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews,
asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus,
and Pilate gave him permission.
So he came and took away his body.
Nicodemus also,
who earlier had come to Jesus by night,
came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, a
bout thirty-five kilograms in weight.
